

	angels compare with other Christian traditions.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Knowledge and Understanding

These questions test how well the students know and understand what they have learnt. They could ask students to define a keyword, describe an event or explain a belief/practice.

Evaluation

These questions give students a statement that they should consider and critically evaluate.

They should consider different points of view and evaluate the strength of these view points.

Reflection

These question ask students to reflect on what they have learnt and think about how it applies to their life and own beliefs.



ASSESSMENT

Students are constantly assessed during RE lessons through different methods. These include key knowledge tests to check learning and understand of a topic and also written questions and discussions to assess students evaluation and analysis of statements.

There are 2 summative assessments each year to test their knowledge, understanding and evaluation skills.

HOW TO SUPPORT YOUR CHILD




Notre Dame

Revision Guides and Textbook


Our very own Mrs Cleary helped to write the textbook for this new course. It is available to buy online from many different retailers. It is called:

	Focus	Theme Title	Description
Theme 1	Religious Understanding	The Search for Love	Beyond romantic feelings and desires, there is a deeper kind of love based on a decision to sacrifice for the good of the other.
Theme 2	My Body	Love People, Use Things	Consumerism can lead to objectification and this could cause us to treat people the way we treat things.
