
We do not ask anything unreasonable and therefore it is expected that all members of our community abide by the rules of the school community.



Where students are consistently meeting and exceeding expectations they will be recognised. If a rule is not followed appropriate action will be taken which is both fair and purposeful.









Absences through illness



#### ASSESSMENT IN KS3

In Year 8 (same as Year 7) we use two types of assessment to identify your child's subject-specific knowledge, skills and understanding, how these are developing over time and any interventions needed to further support your child.

- Daily assessment in the classroom
- Formal Assessment






### FORMAL ASSESSMENT IN KS3



Students will be formally assessed at least twice a year in each subject (with the exception of rotational subjects that do not teach students over the whole year).

This happens in normal class time rather than during a set assessment week. This allows each departments to assess pupils when it is most relevant and ensures we do not overload our younger students.

Formal assessments are structured around the key strands of knowledge, skills and understanding that are necessary for success within that subject area.



Formal assessments also refer to content from previous units of learning to promote the long-term acquisition of knowledge and to ensure we assess your child's increasing overall knowledge of the subject.



### FORMAL ASSESSMENT IN KS3




Your child will be given two weeks' notice of a formal assessment. Details about the content of the assessment, how to revise and the assessment date will be posted on Satchel One.

Your child will be given feedback after each formal assessment, which they will act on in lesson time.




If the teacher feels that your child's assessment result indicates that they are not making expected progress and this is not connected to concerns about their attitude to learning or their attendance (which will be reported regularly over the year), they will let you know.

### **Monitoring - Progress**



M4: In addition to the information shared at M1, M2 and M3, you will also receive:

- A summary of your child's formal assessment results in each subject across the year, as a percentage.
- A statement to say whether they are on track for their personal GCSE target grade, or above or below. To make this decision, we will use the formal assessment results alongside your child's work in class.

## **Monitoring - Reporting**



Students come to secondary school with varying starting points in each subject and progress in different subjects does not always look the same. Therefore the final results between subjects cannot be directly compared.

Nor can we compare a student's results with others to see if they are making good personal progress.



Our ethos is to encourage students to focus on their own progress rather than to compare with others, and that is why we will include a statement to let you know if your child is on track, above or below for their own target.






### What are GCSE options?

Every student will complete the following GCSE courses. These courses will start in Year 9 (September 2026) and be examined at the end of Year 11 (June 2029):

- 1. Maths
- 2. English (Language and Literature)
- 3. Science (2 GCSE qualifications)
- 4. RE
- 5. MFL (French or Spanish)






### What are GCSE options?

Students then pick three additional 'option' subjects to study at GCSE. These are:

- Long Thin 1 option: Start in Year 9 (Sept 2026) and examined at the end of Year 11 (June 2029) (2 lessons per week)
- Long Thin 2 option: Start in Year 9 (Sept 2026) and examined at the end of Year 11 (June 2029) (2 lessons per week)
- Mid-Size 1 option: Start in Year 9 and examined at the end of Year 10 (3 lessons per week)






### How does my child pick their options?

October 2025 - Options Booklet published on the school website and initial letter sent to parents.

**November 2025** – Year 8 guided through the options process via form time curriculum.



January 2026 - Teachers of options subjects to run GCSE taster sessions as part of normal curriculum time. Subjects not covered in the KS3 curriculum will be delivered to all students on a 'drop down day'.




### How does my child pick their options?

12 February 2026 – Options' Evening

An evening that will include:

- 1. Presentation from Mrs Greenwood-Quy outlining the options process.
- 2. Rooms for every options subject, similar to the Y6 open evening.
- 3. Advice from subject teachers and student ambassadors.
- 4. Support from SEND team.
- 5. Careers advice drop in with Mr Day.

**12 February 2026** – Year 8 Options' Evening. The options form will go live on this date.


March 2026 – Deadline for option choice submission.

**Final 2 weeks in July 2026** – Student drop-ins with Mrs Greenwood-Quy to request changes.




